Our sermon series this term takes its cue from the Table at the east end of Chapel, which bears the inscription 'Nobiscum Deus', 'God with us'. This alludes to the great prophecy of the coming of Jesus Christ recorded in Isaiah VII:14: 'The virgin will conceive and give birth to a son, and they will call him Immanuel' (which means, 'God with us'). In the person of Jesus Christ, God reaches out to us in love; he dwells with us, and brings us his light and life. Our speakers this term will reflect on this divine dynamic, as we explore how God might help us to make sense of the complexities of our lives, studies and experiences.

Professor Russell Cowburn is Professor of Experimental Physics at the Cavendish Laboratory, and a Fellow of the Royal Society. His research focuses on nanotechnology and its application to magnetism, electronics and optics. He previously held positions at the CNRS Paris, the University of Durham, and Imperial College London, before returning to Cambridge in 2010. The Rt Rev'd Andrew Watson played the bassoon in the National Youth Orchestra and subsequently gained a music exhibition to Corpus Christi College, where he also sang in the Chapel Choir. He first met his wife, Beverly, during a lecture given by the then Dean of Clare, Rowan Williams. Following ministry posts in the dioceses of Worcester and London, he was consecrated as Bishop of Aston in 2008, and made Bishop of Guildford in 2015. Professor Richard Bauckham is one of the world's most distinguished New Testament scholars and theologians. He read History at Clare from 1966 to 1972, and subsequently held academic positions at the University of Manchester and the University of St Andrew's. He has published widely and influentially on Jesus and the Gospels, New Testament Christology, and the thought of Jürgen Moltmann. His most recent book, *The Blurred Cross* (2024) explores the theology of suffering. Dr Andrew Byers lectures in the New Testament at Ridley Hall, Cambridge, following a lectureship at St John's College, Durham University. Andy is also an Affiliated Lecturer at the Faculty of Divinity, and his research focusses on the Gospel of John. Dr Tobias Roeder read History as an undergraduate in Germany, before studying at Clare for his doctorate. He is currently a Lieutenant in the German Bundeswehr. Dr Mandy Maxwell worked in ceramics and completed a PhD in the History of Art before training for ordination. She served as Rector of Girton before moving to become Vicar of Trumpington in 2019.

### HOLY COMMUNION

A simple and peaceful morning service every Sunday morning at 10 a.m., including a short sermon, and lasting about half an hour. Followed by coffee, tea and fresh pastries in E3. At breakfast after the first Communion of term on 13 October, there will also be a chance to hear about the variety of churches in Cambridge. On 3 November, there will be a joint Communion service with the congregation of Trinity Hall, in their Chapel at the earlier time of 9.30 a.m., followed by a free cooked breakfast. On 10 November, Holy Communion is replaced by the special morning Service for Remembrance Sunday, beginning at Memorial Court at 10.50 a.m. Our sermons at Holy Communion in Michaelmas Term continue our exploration of Luke's Gospel.

#### RECITALS

Each Sunday during full term there is a recital in Chapel at 5.25 p.m. before Evensong. Visitors are welcome, and admission is free. The recital is a preparation for the worship to follow, and those present are invited to reflect and meditate silently during the musical offering. There are no recitals on 10 November (Remembrance Sunday) or 28 November (Advent Carol Service).

#### **MUSIC**

Musical highlights this Term include a late-night performance of Maurice Duruflé's *Requiem* (20 November), a setting of *In Flanders Fields* by David Allen at a special service for Remembrance Sunday (10 November) which marks the centenary of the founding of Memorial Court, a liturgical performance of Zoltán Kodály's *Missa Brevis* at a Choral Eucharist for Christ the King (24 November), and the first performance of *My beloved spake*, a new commission from Icelandic composer Sigurður Sævarsson (17 November). Alongside established repertoire the Choir continues to explore lesser-known works, including those by Luis de Aranda, Cheryl Frances-Hoad, Elizabeth Kimble, Isabella Rusca, and David Bednall.

The Choir sings Choral Evensong at St Andrew's, Stapleford (4 October) and on Tuesday 29 October gives a concert performance of Henry Purcell's *Hail, bright Cecilia* with the Orchestra of the Age of Enlightenment in this term's Great Hall Concert. The Choir returns to Bedford Music Club for *A Child's Prayer*, a programme exploring youth (31 October), and gives an Advent Carol Service at St Mary's, Rotherhithe in Bermondsey, London raising funds for Bede House (10 December). On Wednesday 6 November the Choir performs a live BBC Radio 3 Choral Evensong broadcast from Chapel – those wishing to attend this service must be seated in Chapel by 2.45 p.m.

The two popular Clare Advent Carol Services this year take place on Thursday 28 November and Sunday 1 December (admission by ticket only), and a Staff Carol Service on Tuesday 3 December.

During the December vacation, the Choir tours across Europe including performances in Switzerland, Netherlands and Germany, and performs in London's St John's, Smith Square on Monday 16 December. Full details are available from the Chapel Office, or at www.clarecollegechoir.com.

At Choral Evensong on Thursday 17 October, we commemorate the life and martyrdom of Clare alumnus Hugh Latimer. Latimer was a Fellow of Clare, later Bishop of Worchester, and was burnt at the stake in Oxford in October 1555.
